As a fifth grade team, we think it is important for all students of American History to understand important parts of our history. We have created a Great American Award to help them achieve this. This award is optional. Students are NOT required to do this but they are strongly encouraged.

In order to earn the Great American Award, students must pass off all five (5) of the required memorizations and four (4) of the optional projects. The requirements must be passed off by your child's teacher, who will keep track of what has been passed off. The work needs to be the students' own quality work. This is a GREAT American award, not a "good" American award.

- **The Pledge of Allegiance—written down with no more than 3 mistakes**
- **The National Anthem—memorized 1st and 4th verse, can be said or sung in front of teacher**
- **U.S. States and Capitals—fill out a blank map given to them by teacher with states and capitals, spelling not graded**
- **The Preamble to the Constitution of the United States—memorized and stated in front of teacher**
- **3 hours of service given to a charity, an institution, neighbor or anyone other than family member**

In addition, students will pick 3 projects from the next page.

Students have the entire year to work towards completing all parts of the challenge. There will be limited designated times that students can work on studying the requirements for the challenge at school, students should also be dedicating time at home towards studying the requirements as well. All students who complete The Great American Challenge will be honored with a special award at the end of the school year.

All memorizations and projects for the Great American are due on Friday, April 23rd.

Please review the attached packet with your child. **Both of you sign and return this front page only to your child's teacher no later than Friday, August 21.**

We just want to make sure all parents are aware of this information starting the year.

The Great American Challenge Requirement 3:

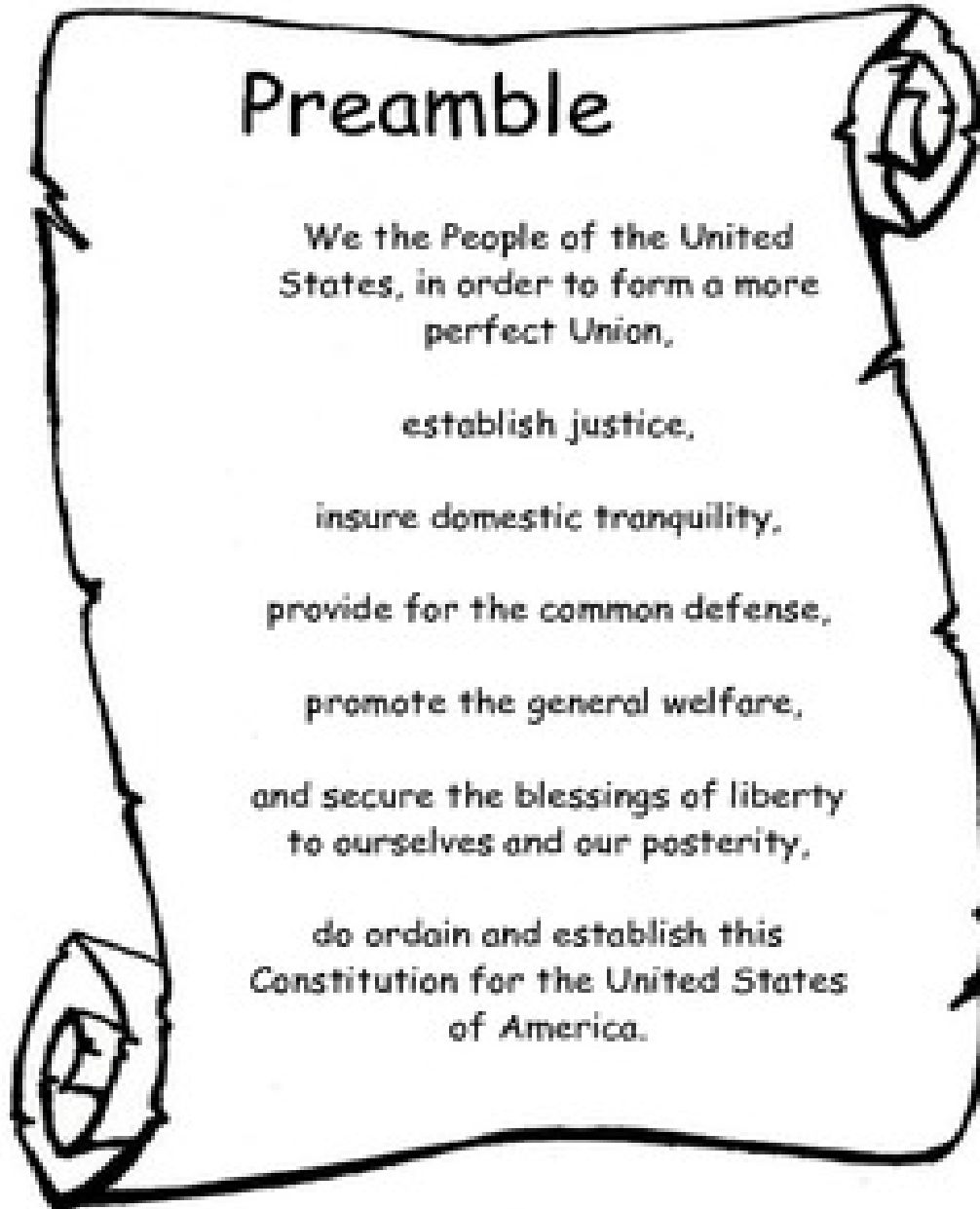
U.S. States and Capitals

The Great American Challenge Requirement 4: The Preamble to the Constitution of the United States

To pass this requirement, students must memorize the Preamble and may not receive more than 1 help hint from the teacher.



Optional Projects (4)

Memorize and recite The Gettysburg Address.

Memorize, recite or write the list of U.S. Presidents in order with first and last names.

Create a timeline of 10 Great Americans. Include a paragraph of accomplishments for each American. Only one timeline per student.

Write one more paragraph on who you think was the greatest American of the 10.

Create a 3d project showing all the branches of the military. You can use playdoh, legos, fabric, cardboard, etc.

Write a 200 word historical fiction story.

Recite from memory the Declaration of Independence.

Create an art project (sculpture, painting, song, poem, dance, movie, etc.) about what it means to be patriotic. Include a short answer essay about what it means to be patriotic or what your art project is a symbol to you.

Study a great American scientist or inventor. Make a working model of one of their experiments or inventions and do a one page write up of how it works.

Make a game based on an event in American history. The game must be for two or more players, be sturdy and usable, be original and come with instructions. The game must also have a definite objective. (How do you win?)

Read a nonfiction book of an American historical event. Do one of the projects listed below about the book.

- Make a powerpoint, Keynote or iMovie presentation
- Do a 5-7 minute oral presentation for the class.

Read a historical fiction book about an event in American history. Write a two page book report and draw a picture about the book.

Study the evolution of one of the following topics: fashion, transportation, film or communication in America. Create a display that you will present to the class. The display must include facts, pictures, and an explanation of how your topic changed over time. Only one evolution per student.

The Great American Challenge Requirement 5: Three Hours of Service

The service cannot be for your family. The service can be three separate one hour projects or one three hour project. You must return a note signed by your parents and/or the person or organization that you performed the service for.
